DEAR PILGRIMS OF THE ROSARY,

Every mother remembers the time her child graduated from crawling to walking, the first moments her child made those first wobbly yet amazing steps! Even when the child enjoyed the "freedom" of walking alone, every mother would walk behind or along her child. She teaches her child an important lesson, that when crossing streets or perilous paths, it is best to hold her hands, or those of others, and *walk together*. It is not difficult to imagine that the Blessed Mother did accompany her son Jesus as he learned how to walk. Yes, Jesus is fully Divine yet fully Human – He grew in age and in wisdom, according to the Scriptures (Luke 2:52) – He must have learned how to walk under Mary's loving and attentive gaze, or held her hands and *walked together* with her.

Synodality (syn i.e, "together", hodos i.e., "way") means to be on the way together, to walk together. It indicates the path along which the People of God walk together. Indeed for St. John Chrysostom, the Church is a "name standing for 'walking together' (σύνοδος)". You celebrate this year's *Dominican Rosary Pilgrimage*, within the broader context of the ongoing celebration of the Synod of Bishops (2021-2023) with the theme "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission".

The Blessed Mother was present and part of the nascent Church – "All these devoted themselves with one accord to prayer, together with some women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers" (Acts 1:14). Through her the Word became Flesh. She was present at beginnings of the Church, the *Mystical Body of Christ*, indeed she is its "pre-eminent and singular member" (*Lumen Gentium*, 53). Undoubtedly, she accompanies the pilgrim Church that journeys in communion towards the Father, in fidelity to Christ, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Her words echoes beyond Cana, she tells us what is essential for the synodal journey: "**Do whatever my Son tells you!**" (John 2:5).

As you make this Rosary Pilgrimage, we ask our Blessed Mother to walk with us, to accompany our Holy Mother Church, *the pilgrim people of God*, so that the priestly prayer of Jesus for our communion, *ut unum sint* (John 17:21), may become more fully realized.



DOMINICAN ROSARY PILGRIMAGE

The Dominican Rosary traditionally consists of 150 Hail Marys, one prayer representing each of the 150 Psalms included in Sacred Scripture. As friars and nuns sang the psalms, the laity joined their voices in raising Aves.

The Holy Rosary will be prayed during the Dominican Rosary Pilgrimage according to the Dominican form. However, throughout the day, we encourage pilgrims to visit the chapels of the basilica, dedicated for the day to the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary.

We invite you to visit each chapel and contemplate the mysteries of the lives of Jesus and the Virgin Mary. As an aid to your prayer, we suggest that you visit each chapel, meditating on the following intentions:

Annunciation For vocations to the priesthood and religious life

Visitation For expectant mothers to receive the care and support they need Nativity For those struggling with fertility and for an end to abortion For all the baptized, that they will worship God with zeal Finding in the Temple For the Church, especially for the Synod on Synodality

Agony in the Garden For those enduring hardship, that they accept the Father's will

Scourging at the Pillar
Crowning with Thorns
Carrying of the Cross

For all those who suffer injustice
For the conversion of political leaders
For those who suffer from addiction

Crucifixion For persecuted Christians

Resurrection For those who do not believe in Christ Ascension For an increase in hope in eternal life

Pentecost For our friends and family members who have left the Church

Assumption of Mary For Our Lady's intercession for the Eucharistic Revival

Coronation of Mary For peace throughout the world

At each chapel we invite you to say one Our Father, one Hail Mary, one Glory Be and then conclude with the following prayer:

Pour forth, we beseech you, O Lord, your grace into our hearts, that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ your Son was made known by the message of an Angel, may, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, by his Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of his Resurrection, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Fr. Gregory Pine, O.P.

Principal Preacher



Fr. Gregory Pine, O.P., is a doctoral candidate in dogmatic theology at the University of Fribourg, Switzerland. He served previously as a parochial vicar at St. Louis Bertrand parish in Louisville, KY, as Adjunct Professor of Theology at Bellarmine University, and an assistant director of campus outreach for the Thomistic Institute. Born and raised near Philadelphia, PA, he attended the Franciscan University of Steubenville, and entered the Order of Preachers upon graduating. He was ordained a priest in 2016 and holds an STL from the Dominican House of Studies. He is the co-author of Credo: An RCIA Program (TAN Books) and Marian Consecration with Aquinas (TAN Books) as well as the author of Prudence: Choose Confidently,

Live Boldly (Our Sunday Visitor). His writing also appears in Ascension's Catholic Classics series and in Magnificat. He is also a regular contributor to the podcasts Pints with Aquinas, Catholic Classics, The Thomistic Institute, and Godsplaining.

Fr. Lawrence Lew, O.P., is the General Promoter of the Holy Rosary for the Dominican Order and is currently Rector of the Diocesan Shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary in London, England. He is also currently chaplain of the Central Curia of the Legion of Mary in London and teaches apologetics, digital media, and Mariology at Blackfriars Hall in Oxford. Fr. Lew was born in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, into an evangelical Protestant family. Formed by the brothers of the De La Salle Christian Schools in their oldest missionary school in Singapore, Fr. Lawrence became a Catholic and has a great passion for theology, apologetics, Catholic culture, music and the sacred arts.

Homilist



Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

For Catholics

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

For our Fellow Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (Jn. 17:21).

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provisions of canon law (canon 844 § 4). Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of Communion by Christians of these Churches (canon 844 § 3).

For those not receiving Holy Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

For Non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.




